11/01 Confirmation of a Quorum

The President called the meeting to order at 3pm. The Secretary confirmed that the members present had formed a quorum therefore, the meeting was duly constituted.

11/02 Apologies



Apologies were received and recorded as listed above.

11/03 Adoption of the Agenda

11/04 Declaration of Conflict of Interest

None of the Members present declared conflict of interest on any of the agenda items.

11/05 President's Opening Remarks

The president welcomed all the members present. He acknowledged that 2022 was a year with mixed performance for the Institute. He highlighted that in 2023, the Council had initiated recovery strategies to ensure that the Institute remained sustainable.

11/06 Review and Adoption of Minutes of the 10th AGM held on 16th September 2022

Members reviewed the Minutes and adopted them without amendments.

11/07 Matters Arising from the 10th AGM

Members considered the matters arising from the 10th AGM and dealt with them as follows:

1) Update on the Construction of Phases 2 and 3 of the ICAM House

Members were informed that in December 2022, the Council had resolved to offer the financing of the project to National Bank of Malawi Plc after observing that Old Mutual Investment Group had missed the deadlines for conclusion of financing arrangement. However, it was reported that there had been substantial increase in the cost of borrowing from December 2022 to the time the bank approved the loan in August 2023. This development was projected to likely have a significant adverse impact on the operations of the Institute, and that the Council was assessing viable cash flow management strategies to ensure sustainability of the Institute.

2) Appointment of External Auditors of the Institute for the Year Ended 31st December 2022

The Members noted that Graham Carr were re-appointed as auditors of the Institute at the 10th AGM.

3) Election of ICAM Council Members

4) Communique of the 2022 ICAM Annual Lakeshore Conference

The Members noted that subsequent to the 2022 Annual Lakeshore Conference, the Institute published a Communique on the substantive matters for consideration by various stakeholders.

11/08 Council Report

The Members received and dealt with the Council Report on the activities of the Institute for the period from September 2022 to August 2023 as follows:

- 1) The Members observed that the Institute had incurred a deficit of K105.2million for the year ended 31st December 2022, and that current liabilities had exceeded current assets by K556million as at close of 2022. The Members noted that the Council had devised a number of strategies that had set the Institute on a recovery path, which included:
 - a) Re-modelling the CPD training approach which had resulted in increased participation at CPD events;
 - b) Enhanced the membership value proposition to motivate members to renew subscription, and new members to register; and
 - c) Scaled up student engagement and career talks to increase student numbers and uptake of examinations.
- 2) The Members noted the recruitment of the new CEO of the Institute, CA. Noel Zigowa, in July 2023. He took over from CA. Charles Chimpeni who acted in the position since the demise of the former CEO, the late CA. Dr Francis Chinjoka Gondwe. The Members also noted the filling of staff vacancies that arose during the period under review.
- 3) The Members observed that the number of students joining the Institute had increased from 446 in 2022 to 606 in 2023. The increase was attributed to initiatives aimed at attracting new students, which included: scale-up career talks, incentives to best performing students, partnerships with quality tuition providers, and increased engagement with existing students.
- 4) The Members noted the re-constitution of various technical committees that supported the Council during the year 2023. The Members further appreciated the various milestones achieved by these Committees in promoting the activities of the Institute.



11/09 Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31st December 2022

The Members reviewed the financial statements and raised concern on the Institute's continued deteriorating financial performance. However, the Council assured the members that the Institute was on a recovery course, and that results for 2023 would be positive. The Members <u>adopted</u> the audited financial statements.

11/10 Election of Auditors for the Year Ending 31st December 2023

The Members approved the re-appointment of Graham Carr as auditors for the Institute for the financial year ending 31st December 2023. The Members noted that by auditing the financial statement for the year 2023, the firm would be concluding the last cycle of the 5-year contract with the Institute. The Institute would put to tender the provision of external audit service for interest firms to bid.

11/11 Election of Council Members

The Members re-elected the following members to serve in the Council:

- 1) Practicing Category:
 - CA. Maggie Kasambara
 - CA. Victoria Munkhondya
- 2) Non-Practicing Category:
 - CA. Daniel Jere
- 3) Diplomate:
 - Hilda Honde was co-opted by the Council because there was no nomination received for the category. The position would fall vacant at the next AGM in 2024.

11/12 Basis for Determining Subscription Fees for 2024

The Members noted that the Instituted had re-modelled its membership service package which had enhanced membership benefits including free and significantly subsidized contributory CPD events. The Members noted that in order to successfully implement these initiatives, the Council had proposed to increase membership subscription fees by up to 15 percent for CAs and Diplomates, and 20 percent for students.

The Members reviewed the proposed rates of increase in fees and observed that the fee increase might not adequately cover the cost of delivery of these initiatives. The Members further observed that the proposed rates of increase in fees were below inflation rate, which could turn out costly. The Members thus <u>resolved</u> that the subscription fees <u>should increase</u> at least by the rate of inflation to ensure financial sustainability of the Institute.



11/13 Consideration of Matters Incidental to the Profession

The Council did not receive any matters from the Members for discussion.

11/14 Date of the Next Meeting

The date of the next meeting would be advised after finalizing the calendar of events for 2024.

11/15 Closing Remarks

The President thanked the members for their diligent and insightful contributions to the issues relating to the Institute and the accountancy profession in Malawi. He urged members to patronize ICAM CPD events to promote the growth of the local profession.

11/16 There being no other business to discuss, the meeting was closed at 6:10 pm.

EGM/2024/01 Confirmation of a Quorum

The President called the meeting to order at 5:00pm. The Secretary confirmed that the Members present had formed a quorum therefore, the meeting was duly confirmed.

EGM/2024/02 Apologies

Apologies were no apologies received.



EGM/2024/03 Adoption of the Agenda

The Members adopted the Agenda without amendments.

EGM/2024/04 Declaration of Conflict of Interest

There were no declarations of conflict of interest by any of the Members present.

EGM/2024/05 President's Welcome Remarks

The President welcomed all the Members present. He highlighted that there was one substantive agenda item that requires the approval of the Members. He said that he hoped for a positive outcome from the discussion of the matter.

EGM/2024/06 Waiver of the EGM Notice Period Requirement

The Members waived the requirement for a 21-day notice period due to the urgency of the matter.

EGM/2024/07 Consideration for Revision of Student Fees

The Members received a proposal from the Council to increase student fees by 25 percent because of unprecedented adverse changes in macro-economic factors. The proposal had come after the Members at the September 2023 Annual General Meeting resolved to maintain fees for students in order to make the qualification affordable. However, subsequent to the 2023 AGM, the Malawi Government devalued the Malawi Kwacha by 44 percent, a development that led to a sharp escalation of prices of goods and services. Further, the Members were informed that the Institute subsidizes about 50 percent of the cost of ICAEW examination fees and study materials, which could not be sustainable at current rates of student fees.

The Members concurred with the Council that while it was important to keep student fees low to ensure affordability, the adverse macro-economic developments made it inevitable to adjust the fees. In view of the need to ensure sustainability of the Institute, the Members approved as follows:-

- a. Revision of student fees and paper based examinations fees by 25 percent.
- b. Revision of computer based examination fees by 40%
- c. Revision of CA Levels 2 and 3 manuals for computer based papers by 50%

EGM/2024/08 Closing Remarks

The President thanked the members for understanding the inevitability of adjusting the fees in view of the adverse changes in macro-economic fundamentals.




Agenda No. 8 Council Report to Members of ICAM

The Council is pleased to present its report to the Members of ICAM, which covers Performance as at 31st December 2023 and substantive activities from the last AGM to August 2024.

1. Performance

a) The Institute registered significant recovery in 2023, having achieved a remarkable growth of 263 percent in consolidated net surplus from a K106million deficit in 2022 to a net surplus of K172million. Revenue from membership and student activities increased by 23 percent from K1.83 billion in 2022 to K2.24billion in 2023. A closer look at revenue performance, significant growth in revenue was registered in membership related revenue streams by 30 percent from K1.42billion in 2022 to K1.84billion in 2023. However, student related revenue registered a 2 percent decline from K404million in 2022 to K397million in 2023.




b) The growth in membership related revenue is attributed to a 14 percent growth in the number of active members from 2,892 in 2022 to 3,288 subscribed members in 2023. The active members translated to an increase in membership subscription revenue from K403million to K518million. Further, revenue from CPD events increased significantly in 2023 because of increased patronage at these events. For the Lakeshore Conference, revenue increased from K821million to K1.09billion, while for other CPDs, the increase was from K195million to K233million.

Analysis of key membership revenue streams is presented below.





c) The drop in revenue from students is largely attributed to the decrease in active students and a decline in the number of examination entries. A summary of performance in student related revenue is presented below. A number of factors contributed to the decline in student related revenue streams the key one being the unprecedented increase in the cost of living in 2023.



Details of the Institute's performance can be read in the financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2023.

2. Membership Value

During the period under review, the Institute remodeled its membership value services by introducing free CPDs for paid-up members, partnership with other institutions to provide preferential services to ICAM members in good standing, and highly subsidizing contributory CPD events. These initiatives have assisted members, especially those self-sponsored, to remain up-to-date with professional skills and competence.



In addition to value services to members, the Institute continued to assist organizations to recruit members in good standing through free circulation of job vacancies to the members. Organizations also engage the Institute for professional reference of prospective accounting and finance employees as well as audit firms. The Institute is in the process of establishing an interactive job placement platform for active members to access employment opportunities and other accountancy assignments.

3. Student Services

a) Student development

Active students

During the period under review, the Instituted administered the development of 3,134 students compared to 3,189 for 2022, representing a 2 percent drop. While overall number of active students decreased in 2023, the Certificate in Financial Accounting (CIFA) program registered a 20 percent increase. However, the Diploma and the Chartered Accountant (CA) qualifications had fewer active students than were during the prior year 2022. The table below presents the movement in student numbers for each qualification.

Examination entries

While the number of active students dropped by 2 percent, total examination entries declined by 5 percent, from 9,875 in 2022 to 9,401 in 2023. The Institute attributed the decrease in examination entries to adverse economic conditions which affected financially underprivileged students.

Completion of levels

During 2023, a total of 527 students completed various levels of qualification compared to 636 in 2022. It is pleasing to highlight that at close of 2023, the Institute had 4 students who completed the local CA professional qualification. b) Student recruitment drive

The Institute scaled up engagements with prospective students for the three programs of study. The initiative yielded positive results evident in the 28 percent overall increase in new registrations. Details of new student registrations in each program are indicated in the table below:

4. Driving Value of the Accountancy Profession

a) Contribution Towards Development of National Socio-economic Policies

The Institute presented proposals for consideration in the formulation of national budget and tax policy in December 2023. Other notable contributions included: participation in the National Risk Assessment on Money Laundering and Terrorist Financing; Contribution towards the development of national strategy for trade in services; and the implementation of International Public Sector Accounting Standards as a financial reporting framework for the Government of Malawi. In additional to contributions towards national socio-economic policy formulation, the Institute recommended some of its members for appointment to Boards of various institutions, both in public and private sector.

b) Collaboration with Other Local Professional Associations

The Institute jointly held a workshop on professional ethics with the Malawi Law Society and the Medical Council of Malawi. Apart from joint workshops, the Institute initiated the resuscitation of the Institute of Directors (IoD) which had become dormant for more than a decade. The initiative to revive IoD is being carried out in liaison with the Institute of Internal Auditors and other professional associations.



c) Collaboration with Other Institutions of Higher Learning

The Institute developed joint qualifications with the Malawi School of Government, the Malawi University of Business and Applied Sciences, UNICAF, the Catholic University of Malawi, and the Malawi College of Accountancy. These qualifications are undergoing stakeholder validation to ensure that the content is within industry expectation.

5. International Relations

In a spirit of strengthening knowledge sharing, the Institute participated at the Pan African Federation of Accountants (PAFA) AGM and conference held in Mauritius in June 2024. The Institute also hosted a joint International Executive Retreat with the Zambia Institute of Chartered Accountants (ZICA) which drew participants from Malawi and Zambia. Further, ICAM and ZICA have a standing arrangement for exchange visits the outcome of which include improvements in membership and student value delivery.

6. Governance Operations

The Council is supported by sub-committees in discharging various governance responsibilities. During the period, the sub-committees diligently performed advisory activities to ensure effective service to the profession and the general public. The following Committees actively discharged advisory duties:

a) Audit Committee

Responsible for advising the Council on matters relating to effective financial management of the Institute. This Committee was led by CA. Victoria Munkhondya, a Council Member.

b) Human Resources Committee (HRC)

During the period, the HR Committee facilitated a holistic review of the Institute's Terms and Conditions of Service in a bid to improve the working environment for employees. The HRC also initiated improvements in the Institute performance management system which has led to improvements in overall performance. This Committee was led by Ms Hilda Honde, a Council Member.

c) Examinations Committee (EC)

The EC is responsible for overseeing student development activities, thus ensures that the Institute has appropriate professional development quality systems in place. The Committee is also responsible for approving student examination results. The EC was led by CA. Dalitso Gadama – a Council Member.

d) Technical Standards Committee (TSC)

The TSC advises the Council on technical matters relating to the profession. During the period, the TSC was led by CA. Lawrence Dururu and worked on a number of technical projects, including:



- i) A research on the adoption of IFRS for SMEs;
- ii) Presented an issues paper for consideration in the formulation the National Budget and Tax Policy to Malawi Government, through the Ministry of Finance and Economic Affairs;
- iii) Developed a guidance on regulatory compliance by cross-border accountants and auditors;
- iv) Guidance on the application of IAS 29 Financial Reporting in Hyperinflationary Economies;
- v) Advisory Notice on Tax Stamps.

e) Assurance Governance Committee (AGC)

The AGC advises the Council on matters relating to audit and assurance services. During the period, the AGC developed a guidance to members and the general public on the rotation of auditors. The AGC was led by CA. Hastings Nyirenda.

f) Ethics and Investigations Committee (EIC)

The EIC investigates allegations of professional misconduct perpetrated by the Institute's members. During the period, the EIC investigated 8 cases of which 5 were concluded. The EIC was led by CA. Moses Chiutsi. The EIC has an ex-officio member who is a legal practitioner recommended by the Malawi Law Society.

g) Membership and CPD (MCPD) Committee

The MCPD vets membership applications for Council approval which are then submitted to the Malawi Accountants Board. The MCPD also advises the Secretariat on matters relating to CPDs and membership recruitment. During the period, the MCPD vetted 390 applications which were subsequently admitted.

h) Disciplinary Committee (DC)

The Disciplinary Committee presides over cases of professional misconduct which are prosecuted by the EIC. The DC is an independent Committee led by a legal practitioner recommended by the Malawi Law Society. So far, there are 4 cases that have been concluded and ready for hearing.

i) Public Sector Committee (PSC)

The PSC is a liaison Committee with the Malawi Government on matters of public sector accounting, and public audit. The Committee worked with the Technical Working Group for the implementation of IPSAS in Malawi. The PSC's work contributed to the adoption of IPSAS by the Malawi Government.



j) Nominating Committee (NC)

The NC is responsible for vetting nominations for ICAM Council positions. The Committee also vets applications from ICAM Members interested to serve on Boards of various organizations as may be requested. During the period, the NC vetted a number of applications from members that expressed interest to serve on Boards of various entities. During the period under review, CA. Christopher Kapenda led this committee.

Agenda No. 10 Appointment of Auditors for the Year Ending 31st December 2024

Members are being requested to consider the approval of Grant Thornton as the new external auditors for the Institute for the year ended 31st December 2024.

As a matter of background, the Institute engages an external audit firm on a 5-year term that is subject to renewal at every AGM. The contract for the previous audit firm, Graham Carr expired at the conclusion of the audit of financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2023. The Council invited eligible audit firms to bid through an open tender, and upon a rigorous evaluation, recommended Grant Thornton to be awarded the contract for the next five years. Subsequent re-appointment of the firm would be subject to approval at every AGM.

The Council hereby submits its recommendation to approve the appointment of Grant Thornton as the new external auditors for the Institute.

Agenda No. 11 Election of ICAM Council Members

Members are being requested to elect (new) members to fill vacancies that have arisen in the Council.

1. Council Vacancies

Members are being requested to fill 5 council vacancies following the retirement of five Council Members. The vacancies are in the following categories:

a) Practicing (PR) category – 1 vacancy

Has arisen following the retirement of CA. Moffat Ngalande

b) Non-Practicing (NPR) category – 3 vacancies

Have arisen following the retirement by rotation of CA. Delvin Khongono, CA. Martin Msimuko, and CA. Alfred Mtetemera.

c) Diplomate category – 1 vacancy

Has arisen following the retirement of Hilda Honde.

2. Criteria for Eligibility of Candidature

An ICAM member is eligible for nomination as a candidate for Council position when the following criteria is met:

- a) Be fully paid-up member;
- b) Has submitted a CPD return for the preceding year (2023 in this case);
- c) Not under any disciplinary sanctions or disciplinary investigations instituted by ICAM;
- d) Is serving or has previously served in the Council or any of the Institute's technical committee;
- e) Has served 2 terms of 3 years each under Article 36 of the Institute's Memorandum and Articles of Association as amended in 2018, commencing in 2019;
- f) Be nominated by paid-up members who would have submitted CPD returns before the closing date for submissions;
- g) Must meet criteria for Council membership category (for the PR category should be an audit practitioner serving in a duly registered audit firm; for NPR and Diplomate categories should be registered as such; and for Academia category should be a member serving as academic staff in an institution of higher learning.

3. Approved Nominations

a) Practicing Category

The Council received 1 nomination for the position. However, the nominee did not meet the requirements. The Council will therefore apply Article 40 of the Institute's MEMARTS to fill the casual vacancy until the next AGM in 2025.



b) Non-Practicing Category

Agenda No. 12 Approval of Basis for Determining Subscription Fees for the year 2025

1) Members are being requested to approve the increase in subscription fees for 2025 by up to 20 percent. In arriving at the rate, the Council considered that the year-on-year inflation rate as of July 2024 was 33.7 percent (according to the July 2024 CPI report by the National Statistical Office). The Council acknowledges the need to balance economic implications on the members and the need for sustainability of the Institute, thus recommended a middle rate as proposed above.

The Council submits its recommendation for approval.

2) The Members are further requested to note that the Council approved the introduction of a Benevolent Fund for the purpose of assisting members who would be in destitute situations. Guidelines for using the funds were circulated on 28th May 2024. The Council hereby invites members to contribute voluntarily on an individual basis, or organizations can make similar contributions.

Proposal to Introduce Sitting Allowance for Council Members

Members are being requested to approve that Council Members be paid sitting allowances for attending Council Meetings starting in 2025. It was observed that members appear reluctant to apply to serve in the Council because of limited incentives. The introduction of sitting allowances is to recognize the noble service discharged by the Council Members. The following rates are therefore being proposed:

a) President: K100,000 per sitting

b) Vice President: K75,000 per sitting

c) Council Members: K50,000 per sitting
